



# THE THEME OF LOSS

Loss is sometimes inevitable.

People are sometimes too willing to give up, which is a form of loss itself.

Loss usually involves grieving, by the people that survive.

When the Edmund Fitzgerald and its crew was lost, the lake "gained" something.

Emotional loss is devastating, but physical loss or the unknown can be just as difficult.

### THE TITANIC

The theme of tragedy and loss is clear in both the actual event and film. This connects to the Edmund Fitzgerald shipwreck through mood and morals, exploring life, death, and sorrow. Though it sank in 1912, the film portrayed the loss felt in the shipwreck in a way that continues to be tragic and moving today.

Loss can be a metaphor to so many aspects of life, and used in literature to give depth, meaning or inspiration. One perspective could be that although sad, it is sometimes necessary. Without loss, nothing could be gained; without sorrow, there could never be happiness.
