

Our **ASL Interpreters** must accurately and quickly interpret spoken words into ASL for the D/deaf, hard of hearing, and neurodiverse community. An ASL interpreter is not simply giving a word-for-word translation of a presentation. Sign languages are languages in and of themselves, and thus ASL interpreters need to convey complex ideas in ASL.

Our **Audio Description Interpreters** must accurately and quickly describe visual elements in real-time for people who are blind, have low vision, or don't have access to video or internet.

Our **Live Transcribers** must quickly capture spoken words and names into written text to provide accurate captioning.

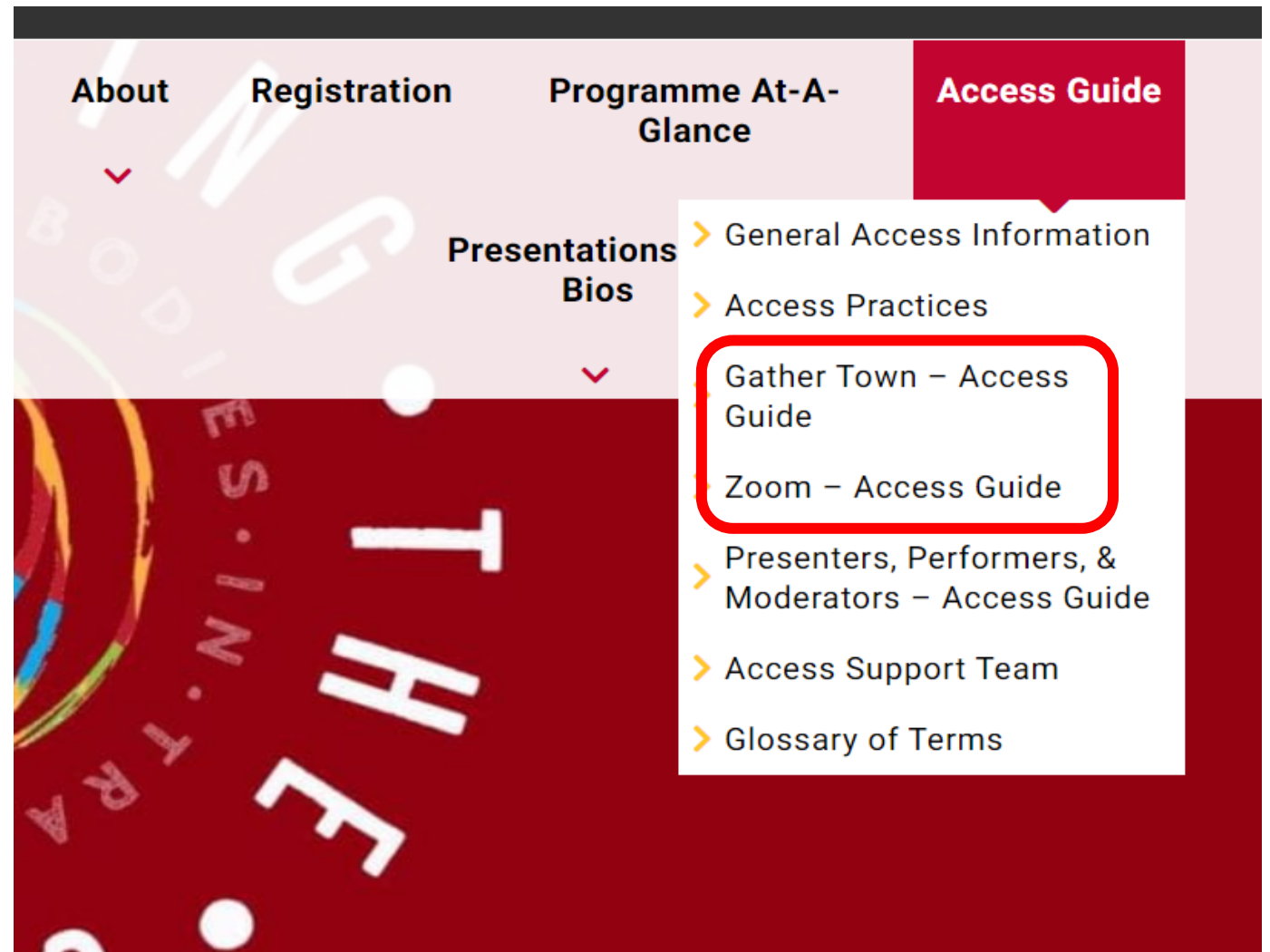


We ask that you help us create a non-judgemental and inclusive space for everyone at this online gathering.

- Give space to people who participate differently than you do.
- Respect people's gender pronouns.
- Make space for both listening and for sharing.
- Wait for people to finishing speaking before responding.
- Share your name before speaking and indicate when you are finished.
- Avoid posting comments in the CHAT during a presentation unless invited for consideration of folx using screen readers.
- Inform people if you are going to speak about difficult things or if your comment or story may be upsetting to others.
- Set computers and phones to vibrate to avoid interruptions.

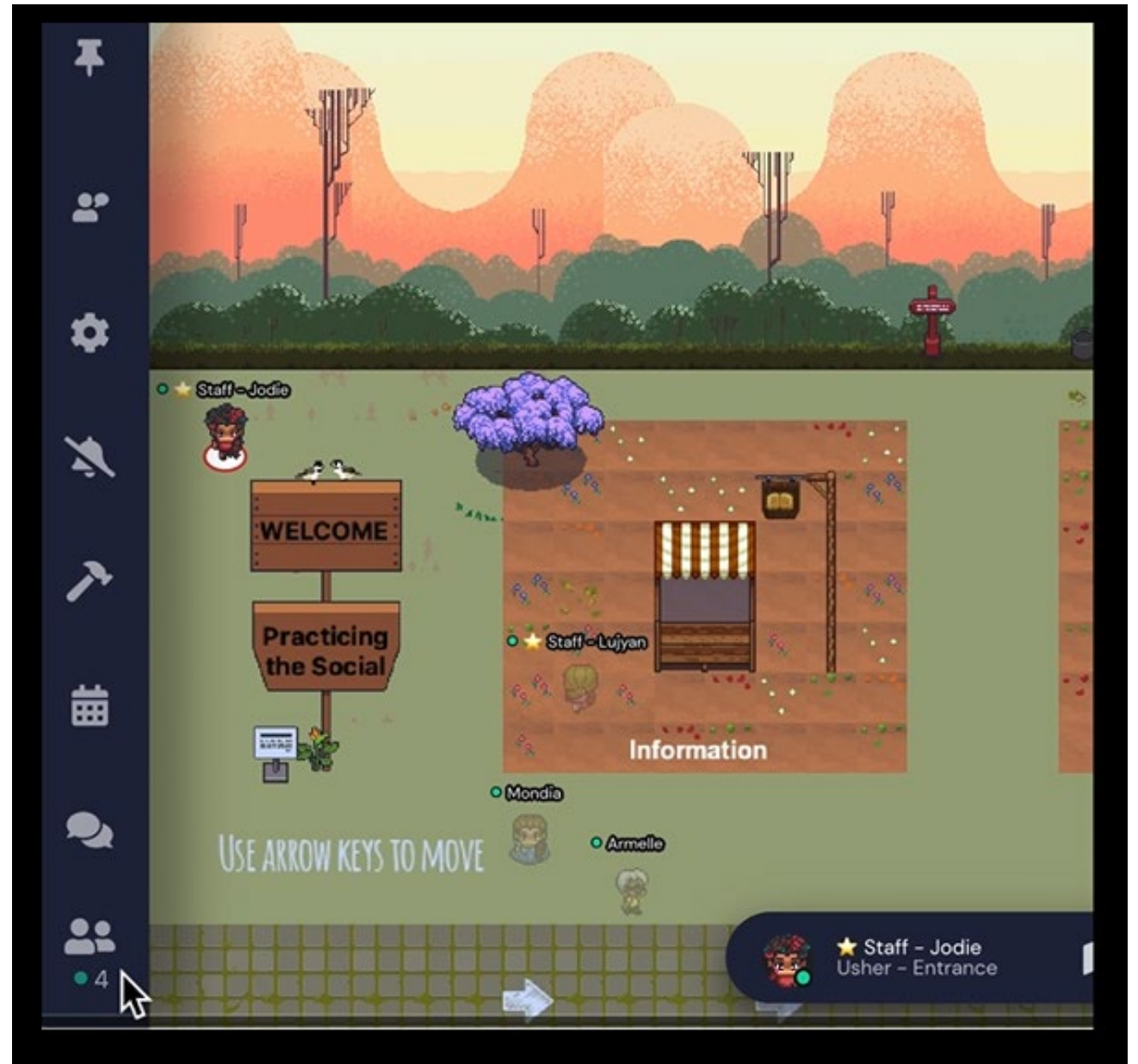
